Reading strategies


Last term, we concentrated on how to improve our writing by thinking carefully about the sentences we write and the grammar we use.

- improve our vocabulary.







Morphology: The **study of** different parts of words. How you build words.

Always ask: do I recognise any mini-words or patterns in the words

I am reading?

- malfunction
- malnourished
 - malaria


How many others can you find or think of?





Etymology: The **study of** where words have come from. Greek, Latin, French ...

Etymology of: mal




mal- The Latin root word mal means "bad" or "evil."


- malfunction (fail to function properly)
- malnourished (not properly nourished)
- malaria (a disease-translates as "bad air")






